Model Classrooms for Children with Autism

Autism Pensacola has been working in partnership with the Escambia County School District (ECSD) for the past five years on our renowned 'Kids for Camp Summer Learning Lab'. Now this partnership is moving to a new level. This fall, three pre-K classrooms in Escambia County Schools have been designated as 'model classrooms' for autism. These 'communication, behavior, social' classes are led by three teachers who have worked at Kids for Camp and have extensive training in Applied Behavior Analysis (ABA). To expand the impact of camp beyond the summer, ECSD has pledged to provide these classrooms with support from Board Certified Behavior Analysts (BCBAs) and additional materials to ensure

that these students are receiving an outstanding start in school. So, what makes the model classrooms different from other classrooms? What kind of training has the staff received? And what kind of progress are the students making? These are just a few of the questions we asked Nicole Kinnard and Josy Licudine-Fuller, two of the teachers working in this program.

Both of these teachers report that a major difference in these classrooms is the type of instruction the students receive. The curriculum is driven by the Verbal Behavior Milestones Assessment and Placement Program (VB-MAPP) and is based on the results of each child's VB-

"Steps for Autism" a Success

Our very first "Steps for Autism" awareness walk was held on October 1st and was a great success! Over 300 people came out to enjoy the beautiful day, raise autism awareness, and raise funds to improve safety programs in our area for those living with autism. Community volunteers from a variety of organizations came out to lend a hand and help make this event extra-special for all of our participants.

It was very exciting to see everyone out enjoying themselves for this great cause! One of our goals was to create an event that our families could enjoy. Many families came out with their children with autism to join in the fun. Walk committee member, Amy Lorton, summed it up when she said, "It was great to see our families at an event where they could go and 'just be'." It truly was a gathering of people who understand and accept those with autism.

Plans for moving forward with our safety initiative are already underway. We have been in contact with Officer Jimmy Donohoe of the Pensacola Police Department and several other national speakers about organizing a regional conference for first responders. We hope to schedule this event sometime in 2012.

We are also working with Officer Donohoe to expand the Take Me Home program outside the city of Pensacola to Escambia and Santa Rosa counties. Possible upgrades to the software may make it easier for families to register their special needs family members in the future.

And we are thrilled to announce that we now have five Project Lifesaver tracking bracelets available for families who have loved ones on the autism spectrum who wander. These bracelets have been provided by The Pilot Club of Pensacola in conjunction with Escambia County Search and Rescue as part of our "pay it forward" program.

MAPP assessment. The activities in these classrooms are planned around the students and their targeted language needs. Other differences include more parent involvement, more natural environment teaching, and the use of discrete trial training in the classroom.

The teachers and paraprofessionals in these classrooms are receiving ongoing training from the Escambia County BCBAs.

In addition, the BCBAs have assisted the classroom staff with room arrangement, picture schedules, and data collection notebooks. These professionals consult with the classroom staff regularly to provide coaching and discuss progress and concerns. Ms. Licudine-Fuller reports that her aides are eager to learn and feel empowered by their new skills. She says, "My aides are excited to see that ABA really works!"

The best part is – the students are making progress! Ms. Kinnard reports, "I have seen huge growth in my students over the past nine weeks." She has a student in her class who did not vocalize at all during the last school year, and this year he spoke his first word! Other students are making great gains in spontaneous verbal requests, toileting, and self help skills. Alison Kropp has reported that she is pleased with the small class size and the additional training the staff is receiving and credits

these two factors with the gains she is seeing in her son, Riley. Nicole Nolan says that she is happy that her son, Colin, can work on the same goals throughout the year in both camp and school.

All of these factors put together mean that young children with autism are receiving the educational foundation they need to move forward successfully. These classrooms will serve as models for area teachers to visit in the future to observe best practice teaching techniques in action. Autism Pensacola and the Escambia County School District are committed to expanding this program in the coming years to serve more children with autism. In the near future, Autism Pensacola will use our Autism Education Fund to support these programs as determined by our board of directors.
